



Transitions

We are approaching the end of our academic year with many transitions about to take place. One of the most exciting will be the arrival of our new residents and fellows. (You will learn more about them in a future newsletter.) At the same time, nearly 40 residents in Internal Medicine and Emergency Medicine are completing their training. Some will continue training in a sub-specialty, while others will begin the practice of Internal Medicine or Emergency Medicine, either in an academic setting or in a private practice setting.

Reviewing the list of transitions in this newsletter, several interesting trends might be worth noting. Of the 30 Internal Medicine residents graduating this month, only one-third will go to sub-specialty training, with GI being the most popular field of study. The number opting for sub-specialty training seems to be lower than in past years. I can recall when as many as 50% of our residents went on to sub-specialty fellowship training. This year, 40% of our IM residents will embark on a career in General Internal Medicine, over one-half of whom will do so as hospitalists. This is clearly a growing trend and probably reflects the ways in which residents are trained these days, as well as an abundance of opportunities particularly in the local community. These trends are worth watching and probably are good reflections of even greater changes we might anticipate in the future delivery of health care services.

Dr. Patrick Cawley -Certified Physician Executive

Patrick Cawley, MD, MBA, Executive Director of the MUSC Medical Center, has been designated a certified physician executive by the American College of Physician Executives (ACPE). ACPE is the association for physicians in health care leadership—to establish and maintain the highest standards for certification of physician executives. A Certified Physician Executive is a licensed MD or DO who has one year of management experience, has 150 hours of tested management education or a management degree, is Board Certified in a specialty, has three years of clinical experience after residency and fellowship, and has successfully passed the 4 ½ day CCMM Certification Program. Eligibility for the CPE is limited to physician executives of the highest caliber.

The credential is awarded by the CCMM on the basis of a candidate's stature as a physician, level of educational achievement, medical management experience, and the successful completion of the CCMM's skill-building Certification Program.

Dr. Sahn receives Trudeau Medal and elected to ATS Hall of Fame

Steven Sahn, MD, Professor and Director of Pulmonary and Critical Care Medicine, received the 2010 Edward Livingston Trudeau Medal at the American Thoracic Society International Conference in Colorado. The Trudeau Medal is awarded to an individual with lifelong major contributions to the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of lung disease through leadership in research, education or clinical care. The award was established in 1926 by the American Lung Association (ALA) and is given in honor of Dr. Edward Livingston Trudeau, a founder and the first president of the ALA.



As the Trudeau Medal recipient, Dr. Sahn was also invited to address the conference. He was also featured in a video shown at the Conference honoring Colorado Pulmonary Fellows.

While at the ATS International Conference, Dr. Sahn was also elected to the Colorado Thoracic Society Hall of Fame at their International Conference in Denver, Colorado in May.

SC State Office of Insurance Programs - Dependent Audit

All MUSC employees (not UMA) who have **insurance through the State** should have received an email from the University Benefits Office last week regarding an **audit of dependents eligible for coverage**. If you have State health insurance (any kind) and **if any family members are covered** on any of your policies through the state (spouse, kids, anyone) - I strongly encourage you to follow through with the self-audit instructions provided and provide all documentation requested now. This audit **DOES** apply to retirees and retirees who have returned to work.

It is of great concern that individuals can lose coverage for their spouse and dependents if they fail to respond when they are selected for random audit. The process for re-instating insurance coverage can include a waiting period up until the open enrollment period after coverage is lost, which could possibly mean **loss of health insurance coverage for a year or more**.

If you choose to wait until you are selected for random audit, you are still encouraged to review the requirements now - some of the documents required (**marriage certificates, tax returns, long-form birth certificates, adoption papers, court orders, etc**) can take significant time (and money) to request and receive copies, especially if these events occurred out of state.

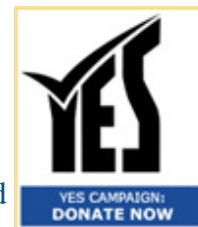


Dr. Kang receives ASCO Career Development Award

Yubin Kang, MD, Assistant Professor, Hematology/Oncology has received one of the 10 (only) 2011 American Society of Oncology (ASCO) Career Development Awards for his project entitled, "A Phase I/II Study: Enhancing Donor Cell Engraftment with CXCR4 Antagonist in Hematopoietic Stem Cell Transplantation".

This is a very prestigious and competitive award that provides research funding to junior clinical investigators to establish an independent clinical cancer research program. Initiated in 1992, the Career Development Award Program began with four individuals receiving grants. To date 189 investigators have received grants through this program, generally fewer than 15 annually.

Inpatient Consults – Attending’s Need to Document the Date & Time of Exam



The date of your face-to-face inpatient consult visit will soon be a required field in the “Inpatient Consult-Attending Comments” attestation in Practice Partner. Please use this template attestation for your inpatient consults. This is important so that the correct date of service is extracted by your coder. It is also important for the attending to authenticate the Practice Partner consult note within 24 hours of the resident to insure appropriate billing.

The attending must also write a note in the inpatient chart to reflect that the patient has been seen including the date and time as well as preliminary recommendations for the patient’s care.

There will be periodic auditing to help the physicians understand their performance and to ensure compliance and accurate billing. Please make it a habit to include the date of your visit on your inpatient consults in Practice Partner.

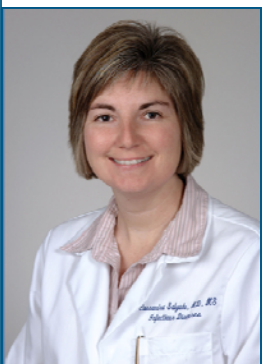
